THE TRACK IS BACK!

A VILLAGE in Wales has welcomed its first train in 56 years.

A new station has just opened at Bow Street in Ceredigion. It means locals can catch a train for the first time since 1965.

Thousands of British stations were closed in the 1960s because people were choosing to travel by car instead of train. Now, we need to travel in more environmentally friendly ways to tackle climate change.

Once lockdown ends, it's hoped thousands of journeys will be made from the station, which is great news for the environment.

ANIMAL NEWS

BEAVER BOOM



A RECORD number of beavers will be released by The Wildlife Trusts in 2021.

The charity plans to release around 20 animals this year. This week, the first beaver family was released in Dorset. More will follow in Derbyshire, Nottinghamshire, Montgomeryshire, Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

Beavers are native to Britain but were hunted to extinction about 500 years ago, for their thick fur and meat.

Craig Bennett from The Wildlife Trusts said: "Beavers help stop flooding downstream... They also create new homes for otters, water voles and kingfishers. What's more, people love seeing them!"

FLIPPING FLIES

DRAGONFLIES perform backflips when they are blown off balance.

Scientists used high-speed cameras to study the movement of dragonflies in extreme detail.

They saw that if the insects are caught upside down they perform a backflip to turn the right way up. The movement is known as 'pitching'. The insects can even perform the move while they are asleep!



LOVEABLE LARRY



LARRY the cat is celebrating ten years at 10 Downing Street, the prime minister's house in London.

Larry is 'Chief Mouser to the Cabinet Office'. He moved in to Number 10 after being adopted from Battersea Dogs and Cats Home. He has now served three prime ministers — David Cameron, Theresa May and Boris Johnson. Go Larry!

THE fountains in Trafalgar Square froze in last week's cold weather.

Storm Darcy brought heavy snow and freezing temperatures to many parts of the UK.

Braemar in Aberdeenshire, Scotland, recorded a temperature of -22.9°C! That's the coldest temperature the UK has seen for 26 years. A food freezer is usually about -18°C, so that is mighty cold!




OVER in the USA, Texans are also feeling pretty chilly this month.

Some parts of Texas hit -18°C last weekend and, for the first time ever, all parts of the vast state are under a winter storm warning.

Icy roads have led to huge car crashes, and some areas have had power cuts. President Joe Biden has declared an emergency in the state.



THIS amazing artwork in Finland has been created entirely from footprints in the snow.

A team of volunteers stomped their way through the white stuff to create the super cool snowflake design.

They used just snowshoes and lengths of rope to make the pattern. The whole thing took two days to complete. It measures an impressive 160 metres across.

Janne Pyykkö was the artist who came up with the idea for the frozen fun.

LIFE BELOW THE CE

The hole that scientists drilled through the ice

SURPRISED scientists have discovered sea life living 900 metres under the ice of the Antarctic.

The discovery of 16 sponges and 22 unidentified animals was made by scientists from the British Antarctic Survey, by accident.

The experts had drilled through almost a kilometre of ice in a massive floating ice shelf to the west of Antarctica. They were collecting samples of mud from the sea floor.


They sent a camera down to take a look at what was going on and discovered the marine life

attached to a large boulder. Some of them are unknown species (kinds of life).

Huw Griffiths is one of the scientists from BAS who made the discovery. He explained: "We never expected these kind of animals... to be found this far from a source of food or daylight. We don't know how they're coping with these extreme conditions."

"There's all sorts of reasons they shouldn't be there," he added.
