● Coin sells for record price

A single gold coin featuring Oliver Cromwell has sold for almost half a million pounds (£471,200)! It was only expected to raise about £100,000 (one hundred thousand pounds).

Oliver Cromwell helped to overthrow King Charles I during the English Civil War. The king was beheaded and Cromwell ruled the British Isles until his own death.

The coin was made in 1656 and there are only 12 in existence.

The nature reserve in Norfolk is home to England's largest grey seal colony.

Rangers are hoping that a record 4,000 seal pups will be born this winter season.

● What a kick!

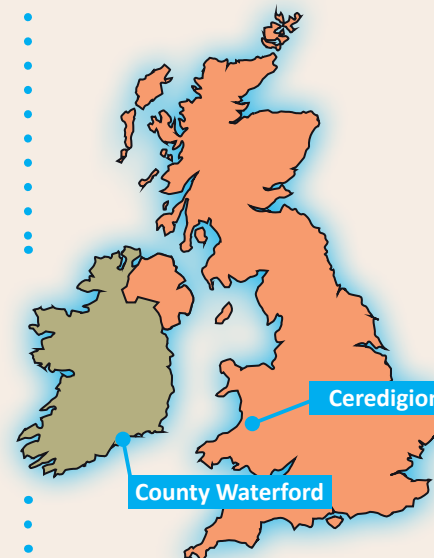
When ten-year-old Aoife accidentally kicked her football into the sea in County Waterford, Ireland, she didn't think she would ever see it again.

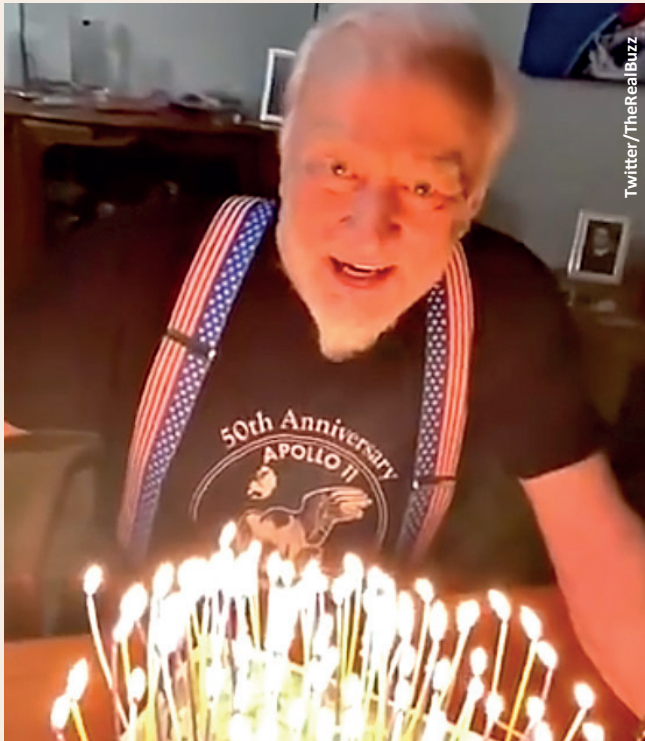

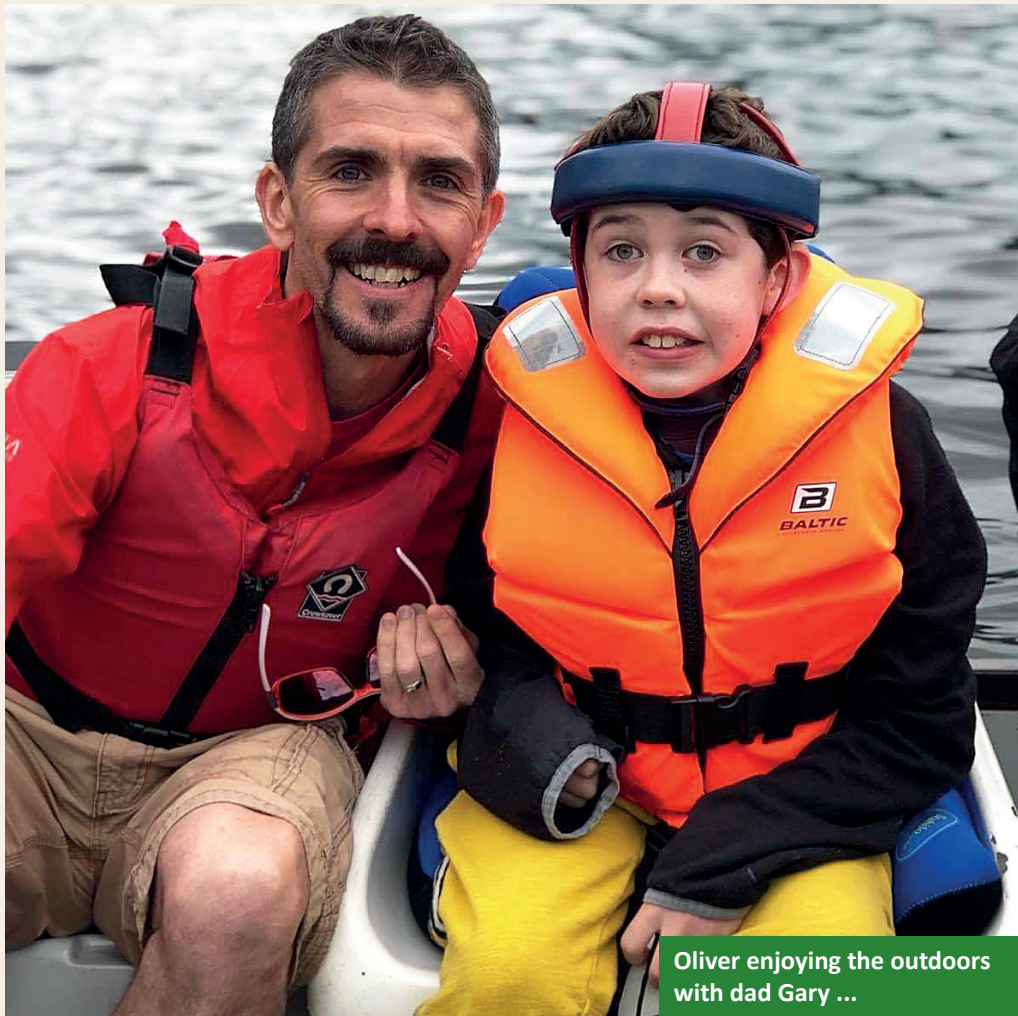

BOY FIGHTS TO SAVE CHARITY



Oliver enjoying the outdoors with dad Gary ...

A 12-YEAR-OLD boy has raised more than £64,000 (64 thousand pounds) to try to save a charity that helps disabled people enjoy the outdoors.

Oliver Voysey suffered a brain injury when he was just two days old. He was left with many difficulties and needs a lot of care. He hasn't let that stop him though! Thanks to a charity called the Calvert Trust, in the Lake District, Oliver has been able to enjoy activities like horse riding, canoeing and rock climbing. His family say it has transformed his life.

But sadly, the charity may have to close. It has lost more than £1 million during the pandemic.

Oliver, who is 13 tomorrow (30th January), has been setting himself challenges to tell people about the charity and to raise money.

He has completed a 13-minute walk and stood without help for 13 seconds, something that is very hard for Oliver to do.

Sarah Voysey, Oliver's mum, said: "Oliver's biggest birthday wish is for the Lake District Calvert Trust to survive. Forget cards or presents, he just wants to return to his favourite place in the world."

FOSSIL HUNTER HONoured

A STATUE of the famous fossil collector Mary Anning is to be built in Lyme Regis, thanks to a 13-year-old girl.

Evie Swire learned all about Mary three years ago and decided there really should be a statue of her in Lyme Regis – Mary’s home town.

Evie and her mum started a project called Mary Anning Rocks to raise money. And, finally, the hard work has paid off! The project has now raised £80,000 (eighty thousand pounds). This means work on the statue can begin.

The first sketches of the statue have been made (right). It will show Mary holding a fossil hammer, along with her beloved dog Tray.

Mary Anning was a brilliant palaeontologist (“pal-ee-nol-o-jist”) – a fossil expert.

Despite coming from a poor background, and not having much education, she made many amazing fossil discoveries, including the first ichthyosaur (“ick-thee-ore”) – a monster marine reptile!
